<u>'Love Songs of the Revolution' Follows Man's Quest to Solve Wife's</u> Murder, Against Backdrop of Geopolitical Turmoil

Bronwyn Mauldin's latest novel sheds light on 1989 Soviet Lithuania; utilizes modern media artifacts to create a surprising, compelling ending

LOS ANGELES – The May 19 release of **Love Songs of the Revolution**, a literary thriller by novelist Bronwyn Mauldin set in the last days of Soviet Lithuania in 1989, is not only timely given the recent events in Ukraine, but combines a traditional memoir with the use of modern-day media artifacts – resulting in a work of compelling fiction.

"The novel's release coincides with the 25th anniversary of the 'Baltic Way,' which marked the beginning of the end of the Soviet Union," Mauldin said. "Today we are looking at events in the Ukraine that are echoes of unresolved issues from that era – many of which are woven into the book's plot."

The first part of the book is constructed as a memoir written by Martynas Kudirka, a member of the Lithuanian Communist Party who comes home to find his beautiful wife sprawled on the floor stabbed to death. Realizing the police will not help with the investigation, he is drawn into a quest to find confidential documents that could not only solve the mystery of his wife's murder but could free a nation.

In addition to the timely geopolitical intrigue, another unique aspect of the novel is the way Mauldin uses modern day media artifacts – including a blog post, Twitter feed, IRS forms and even a book review – in the second half to bring the story to present day and shed new light on Kudirka's memoir.

Mauldin explained, "The 'extras' sections on DVDs inspired the way I structured the story. Unlike with a DVD, though, the story continues in the 'extras.' They expand and deepen the original plot, adding unexpected texture and insight for the reader."
